




STARTING WITH MINDSETS

Questions to Guide Mindset Exploration

These questions were developed from content in Systems Change and Parent Power written by Alex Cortez.

- Who currently holds the power?
- Do you recognize that your system is a political system and often reflects the agenda and values of people of privilege?
- Is your system currently representative and responsive to the needs identified by the parents and community?
- Do you recognize that the system is very good at organizing itself to protect the status quo?
- Do you recognize for the system to change the power flow must be disrupted?
- Do you recognize that in order to genuinely build trusted relationships with parents and communities we must slow down and learn to listen to their wisdom?
- What voices are currently missing in planning, decision-making and policy development?
- What roles do parent and communities have in driving change?
